

# Session Z21-19: Challenges and new approaches for protection of cultural heritage around the world

Organised by **Marika Tisucká** (National Museum of Prague, Czech Republic), **Isber Sabrine** (Researcher and Cultural Heritage Manager | Institució Milà i Fontanals CSIC and Heritage for Peace, Spain), **Emma Cunliffe** (The Blue Shield / Newcastle University, United Kingdom)

Current conflicts in Syria, Iraq and other countries result in the ongoing destruction of cultural heritage, however other peacetime threats around the world make them as much – if not more – vulnerable. Archaeological heritage, religious and other built heritage, archives and even intangible heritage are under increasing threat from sustained population explosion, agricultural development, urban expansion, warfare and looting. These have made the protection of heritage a more urgent and important concern in than ever before.

Within this session, we invite presentations about challenges and new approaches for protection of cultural heritage around the world, but also on more general and more controversial topics. We want to discuss improving the protection of culture heritage around the world. The session will examine national and international efforts in the protection of cultural heritage at different levels, and the role of national and international heritage organizations in the protection of cultural heritage by presenting different cases from different countries. Finally, presentation that discuss illicit trafficking, legal measures, new technologies for heritage reconstruction, and societal reparations in the post-conflict period are also welcome.

#### THE 1954 HAGUE CONVENTION: FROM LAW TO PRACTICE (ID 532)

Emma Cunliffe (Newcastle University / Blue Shield International, Newcastle Upon Tyne, United Kingdom)

This paper examines the 1954 Hague Convention in light of recent training exercises carried out by The Blue Shield with various armed forces and heritage professionals. It questions the prevailing narrative that the Convention is not fit for purpose, and argues that its key issues lie in lack of implementation, in particular highlighting the lack of safeguarding measures implemented by state heritage agencies. Building on this, it will showcase suggestions for better implementation of this vital legislation.

## CONSERVATION MORTARS FOR THE DANUBE LIMES IN SERBIA: SAFEGUARDING THE VALUES OF CULTURAL HERITAGE (ID 1200)

Roman sites located within the former military border – Danube Limes, have been explored for over 150 years in Serbia. A large number of fortifications, settlements, and necropolises, belonging to the period from the 1st to the 6th century have been discovered. Serbian institutions have recently initiated the process of their inscription to the UNESCO WH List, joining the transnational property Frontiers of the Roman Empire. Unfortunately, some of them are endangered and exposed to the decay of time, being in isolated areas, flooded, or simply unmaintained. The MoDeCo2000 project, funded by the Science Fund of the Republic of Serbia, was created with an attempt to make a contribution to their future protection with an innovative methodological approach, comprising the scientific research of construction materials and technologies used and suggestions for the creation of repairing mortars according to the international conservation guidelines and standards. Mortars, bricks, and stones originating from 23 sites were sampled during the project fieldwork and later researched using contemporary laboratory techniques. Based on the research results, the recipes for conservation mortars have been developed. The project's main intention is to promote the essential need of thorough multidisciplinary scientific research for the cause of cultural heritage conservation, connecting archaeology, architectural history, engineering, archaeometry, and conservation science. While creating the database of historical constructions, the project simultaneously delivers recommendations for the future physical protection of the Roman buildings along the Danube in today Serbia and thus contributes to the safeguarding of the Limes multiple values.
